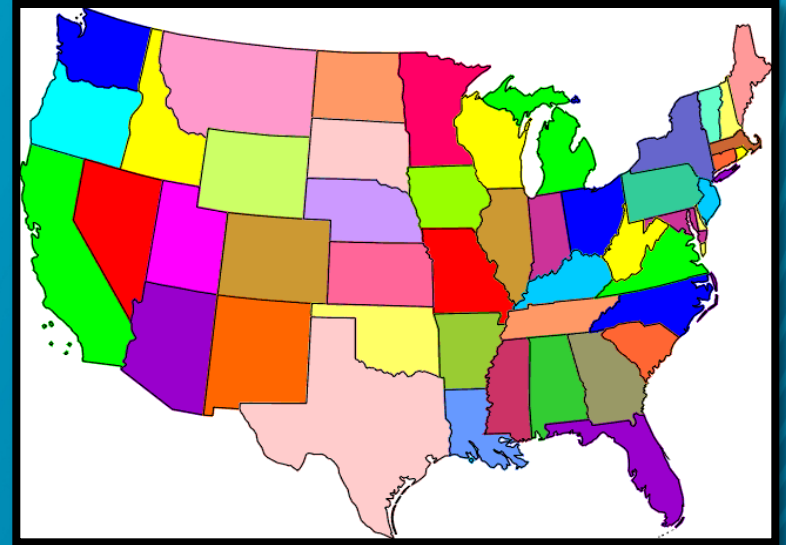

Program frameworks and eligibility set by federal law, but each state can set its own priorities for use of funds



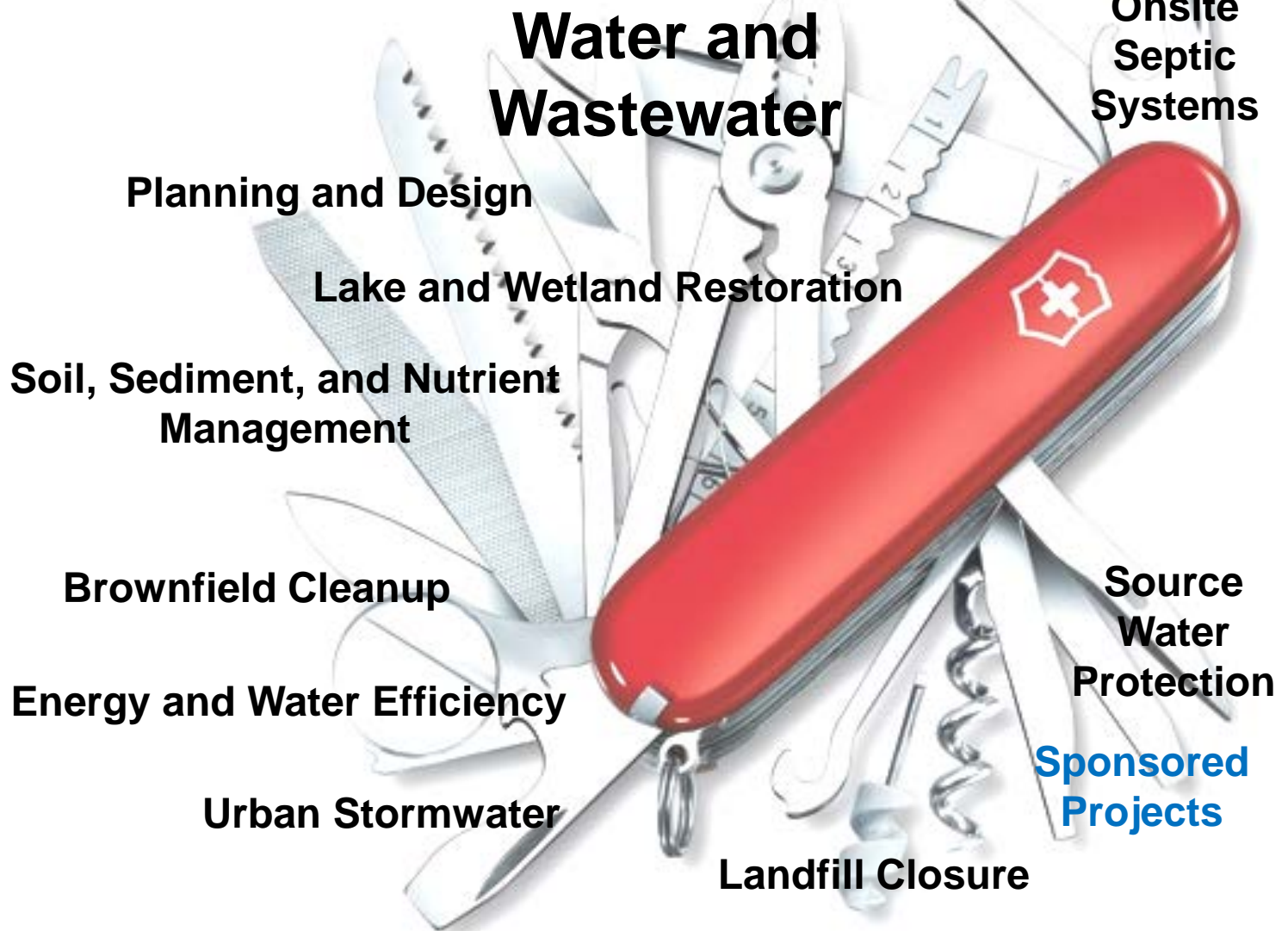

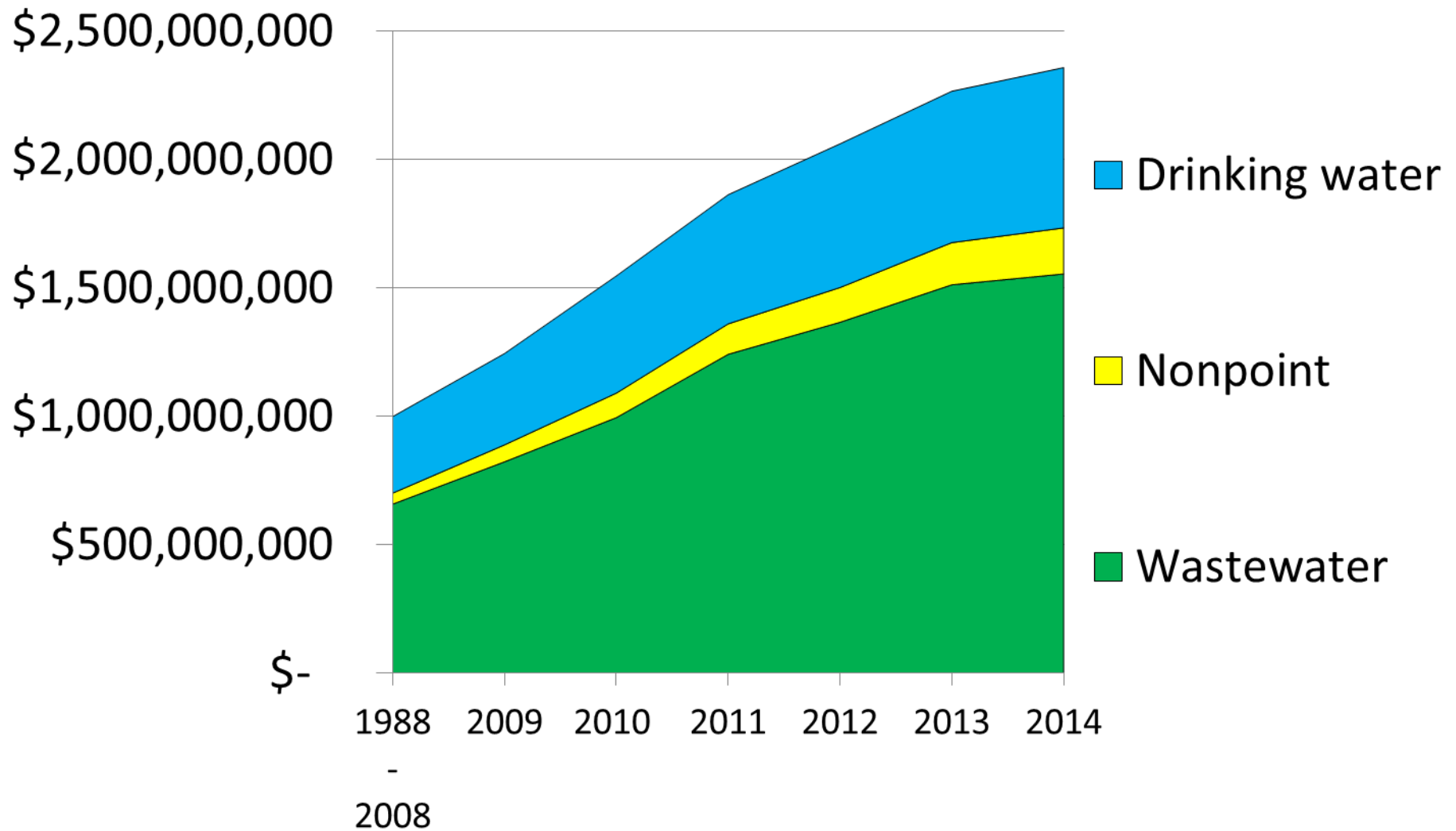

\$190 million since 2003



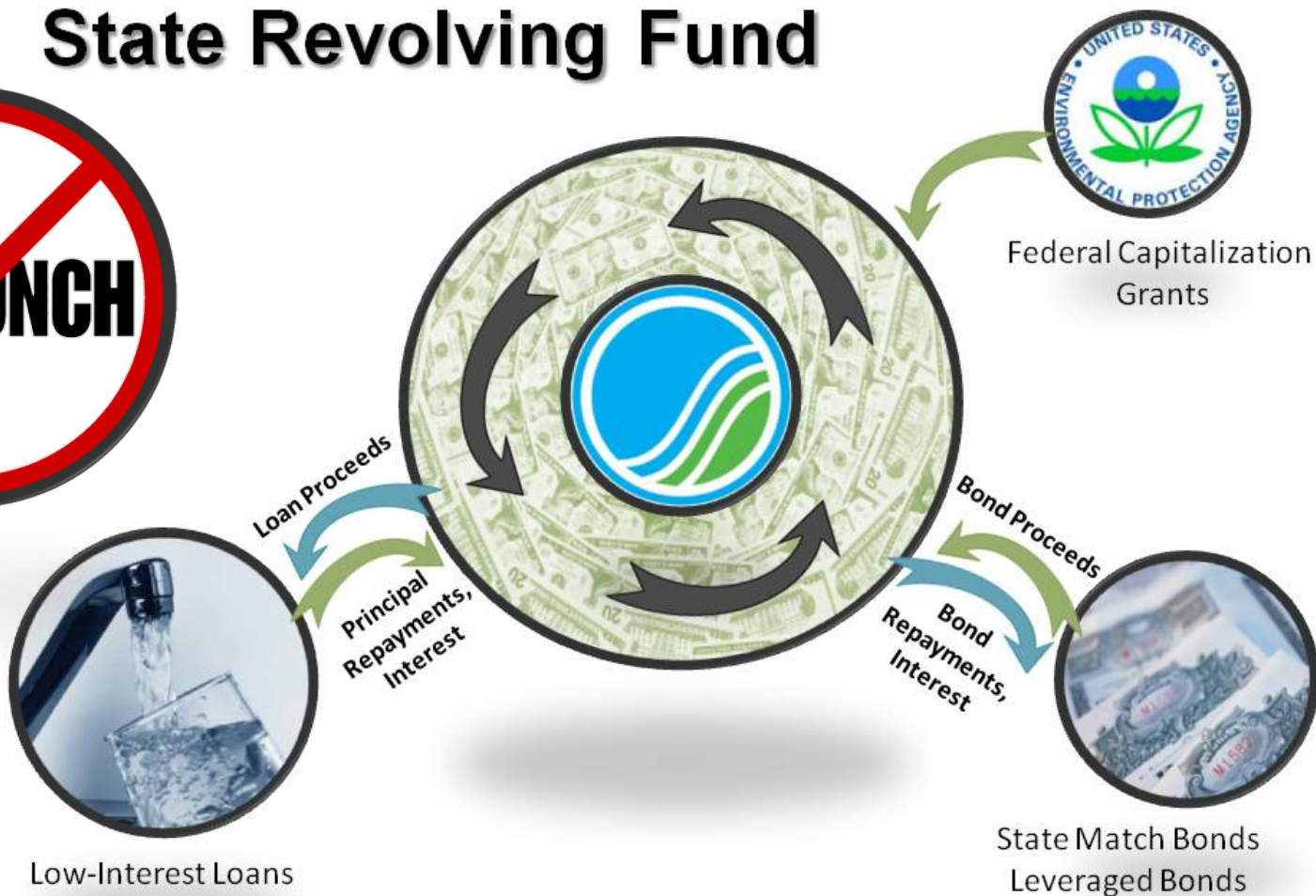

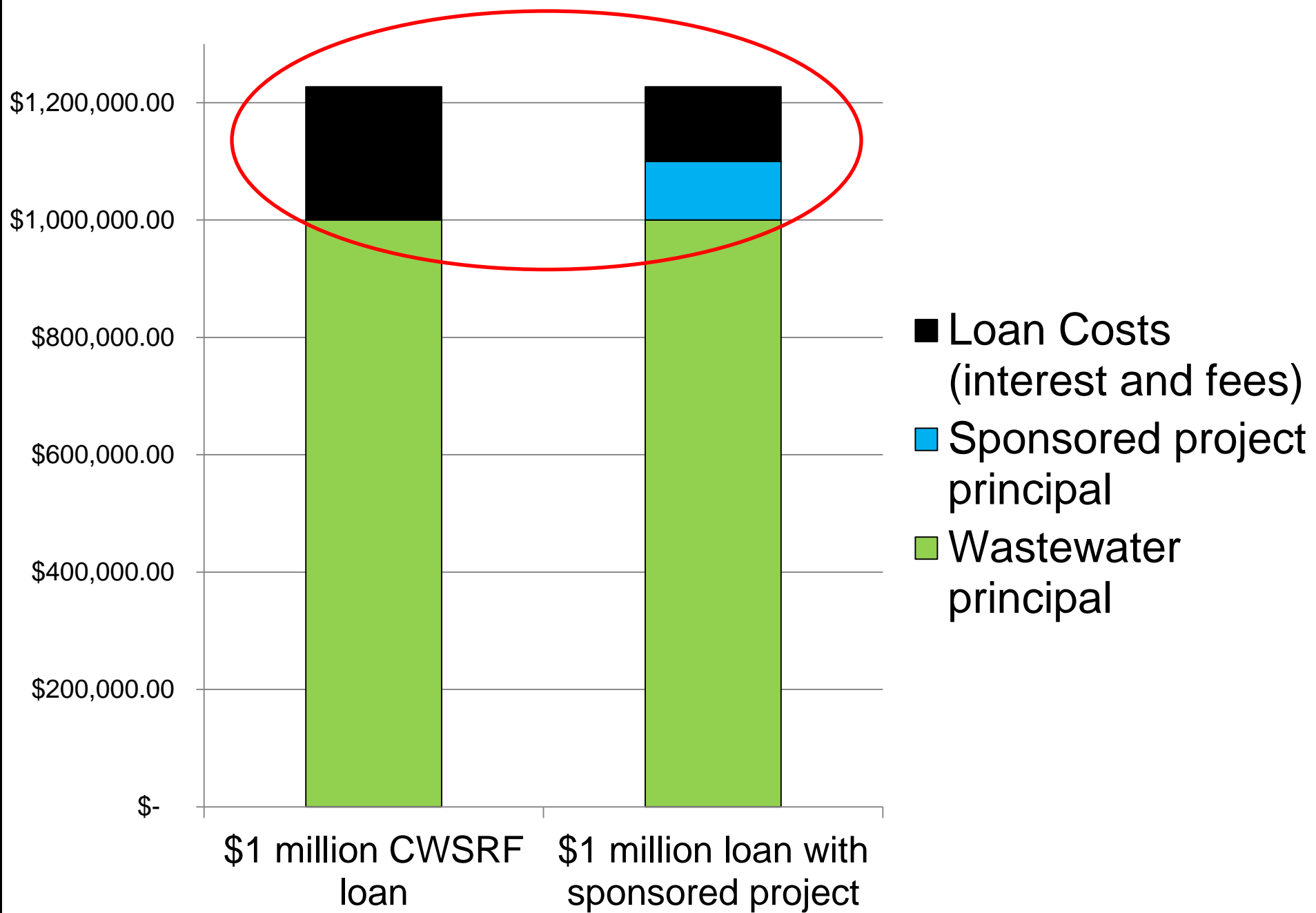
State Revolving Fund

What Can be Done – what practices can have an effect



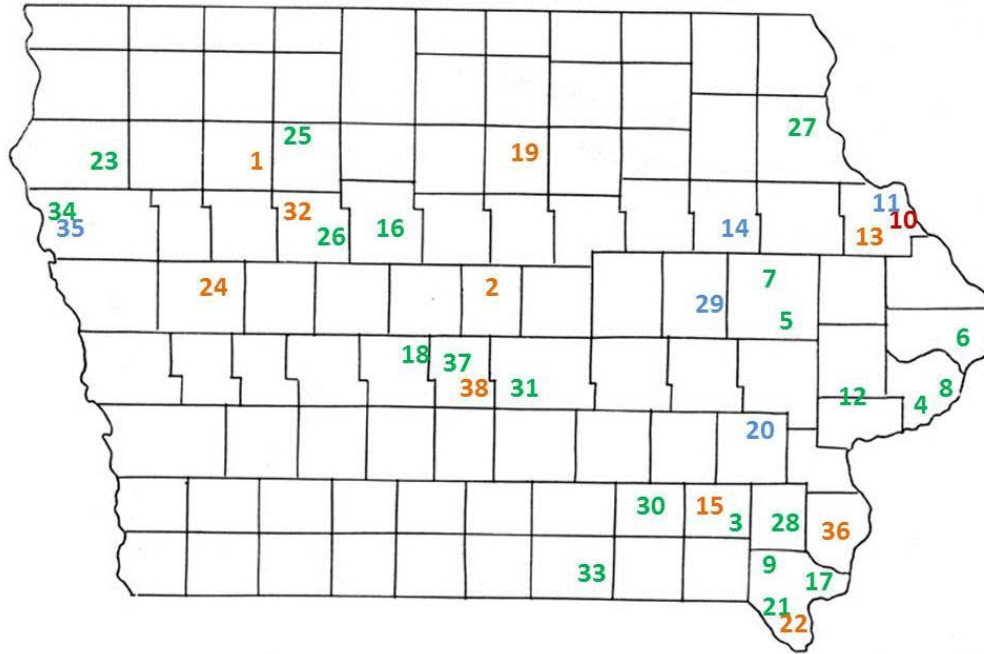
Project Partnerships

Wastewater utilities must partner with conservation organizations such as Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Watershed Management Authorities, County Conservation Boards



Technical assistance, review, and oversight is provided to each applicant through the DNR project managers, Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, and Iowa State University
