 - State Revolving Fund Loans











- 2011: Create Duck Creek Watershed Management Plan
- Salary funding from Iowa
 Department of Natural Resources
 through a grant from the U.S.
 Environmental Protection Agency
 under the Federal Nonpoint Source
 Management Program (Section 319
 of the Clean Water Act).
- E. coli bacteria impairment, T.M.D.L
- 104 page plan, with 9 elements required by the EPA
- "Approved" by the EPA in 2011
- Received Watershed Implementation Grant in 2012 from Iowa DNR (EPA 319 Funds)










• Implementation Grant Funding Breakdown






- Goal: Reduce runoff from urban land uses and bacteria input from urban miscellaneous sources.
- **Task:** Install 10,000 sq' of urban infiltration practices (rain gardens, bioretention cells, bioswales, permeable paving, soil quality restoration) in critical areas over 3 years


Budget:

- \$60,000/3 years (Watershed Implementation Grant in 2012 from Iowa DNR (EPA 319 Funds)
- \$15,000/3 years (REAP funds through the IDALS-DSC)
- \$75,000/3 years (Landowner match)
- 34% of the grant, \$60,000

Urban Conservation: Scott County SWCD Urban Conservation Program

- Technical and financial assistance to residents for the installation of urban infiltration practices
- Program began in 2008
- Over 100 site visits/year
- Nearly 200 practices installed to date
- Funding sources:
 - Iowa Resource Enhancement and Protection Funds
 - River Boat Development Authority Funds

- Often done in conjunction with other practices to meet District requirement of 75% runoff reduction
- Went from 1 to 3 contractors providing services

- Partnership between City of Davenport, City of Bettendorf, Scott County Board of Supervisors, Quad City Home Builders Association & Scott County Soil and Water Conservation District (\$24,500 Annual Salary Contribution)

Urban Conservation: Scott County SWCD Partners of Scott County Watersheds

- Funding from Iowa American Water & in kind donations to conduct Soil Quality Restoration/Rain Garden
 Workshop/Demo at two Habitat for Humanity Homes
- 26 attendees (landscape contractors, environmental professionals, local government staff, Habitat for Humanity staff and Scott County residents)











- As a result of the workshop:
 - 2 Soil Quality Restoration and 4 Rain Gardens were installed at 2 Habitat for Humanity Homes
 - 4 attendees installed soil quality restoration
 - A contractor in attendance sold Soil Quality Restoration and Native Landscaping to a new homebuilder, also a QCHBA board member
 - An attendee installed 2 rain gardens, soil quality restoration and native landscaping
 - 4 others residents aerated conventionally and applied compost after seeing the photos in the newspaper



Land Use vs. Population




Source: U. S. Census Bureau Census 2000 Summary File 1 population by census tracts.
